- Following completion of the devolution of forestry (the Forestry and Land Management {Scotland} Act 2018), Scottish Forestry was established as an executive agency of the Scottish Government on 1 April 2019.
- We support the delivery of the Scottish Government's priorities for Scotland's forests, through guidance, advice, incentives and regulations, and by advising Ministers on forestry policy.




Tree Health

- The threat to our trees and forests from pests and diseases remains high due to globalisation of trade and travel.
- Climate change is likely to exacerbate future impacts from existing as well as new pests/diseases.
- Taking tree health seriously is a collective need.



- Working with partners to understand the biology and epidemiology of pests and diseases to learn how to combat or live with them.
- Undertaking aerial surveillance of Scotland's woodlands to spot early signs of tree health issues.
- Helping to inform legislative developments and communicating with stakeholders about tree health issues.

Our activities









- Issue Statutory Plant Health Notices requiring woodland owners to take action to eradicate, contain or slow down outbreaks.
- Provide targeted plant health grants where it is in the public interest to do so.
- Encourage the reporting of potential tree health issues via TreeAlert.
- Encourage everyone to take proportionate biosecurity measures.

- Large pine weevil (*Hylobius abietis*)
- Great spruce bark beetle (Dendroctonus micans)
- Eight-toothed spruce bark beetle (Ips typographus)
- Pine tree lappet moth (Dendrolimus pini)
- Oak processionary moth (Thaumetopoea processionea)
- Bronze birch borer (Agrilus anxius)
- Emerald ash borer (Agrilus planipennis)
- Ramorum disease on larch (*Phytophthora ramorum*)
- Ash dieback (*Hymenoscyphus fraxineus*)
- Dothistroma needle blight (Dothistroma septosporum)
- Xylella fastidiosa
